
## Principals Report (Cont.)

### Communication.

Attached to this newsletter is an outline of the many ways in which we communicate with you. Please read through to assist you with aspects. It is vital that we have a strong communication with our parent families to support your child at school in all elements of learning and social development.

## Digital Devices.

The World Health Organisation has declared that children under the age of 2 should have no interaction with digital devices. We have to wonder why these are so dangerous for young children and what that means for primary age students. The developers of social media style apps have designed these to be addictive. Consider how much time you even spend on these apps! The best advice I received once was to turn off all notifications and move your FB or social media or gaining apps to a third or fourth screen on your phone.



While it is important for your students to have a good working knowledge of digital technology, it must be balanced with personal interaction and physical activity. Digital technology should never replace personal communication. Consider: how often to do you really talk with your child with eye to eye contact? Strong communication is the key to effective social and emotional development for children and also for developing oral language which is a strong precursor to literacy development. Do the best for your child: No app will replace your lap!

## Curriculum Day

At our recent Curriculum Day the staff were highly engaged by presenter, Wilson MacAskill on the approach to educating behaviour to support students to see themselves as learners through his "Play is the Way" approach. He talked about the need for effective communication to support students understanding that effort and persistence are the keys to learning. He said that research has shown many children think they are expected to arrive at school with knowledge and are required to show what they already know and that this how success is measured. This breeds anxiety. They do not understand that we do not expect them to know everything and are pleased with their struggles and determination as they try to learn. So, when they are upset at home or at school, it is our job as parents and teachers to ask questions and communicate with them. We want all our students, your children, to know that their efforts and persistence are what we value and what will assist them to reach their potential. So, those days when they seem the most challenging, ask them "How can I help you today?"! Next time you say well done, or good job, add ...'because...' and explain why. Then tell them how much you love them for their efforts and how proud you are of them...just like we are.

## Assistant Principals Report

On Friday 26th April, our staff participated in the "Play is the Way" professional development session presented by Wilson McCaskill.

"Play is the Way is a practical methodology for teaching social and emotional skills using guided play, classroom activities and an empowering language-behaviour education using wisdom, not force."

Our teachers and support staff spent the day learning the theory behind playing games that help to teach and increase the social and emotional skills of children. Of course, we also had some fun playing them too.

The Play is the Way program helps to empower children with the understanding of their own behaviour and that of others. It equips children with a language by which to describe behaviour and how to manage it.

#### Play is the Way objectives (Wilson McCaskill):

- To help staff, students and parents of a primary school create a safe learning environment in which students train to be independent, self regulating, self motivated learners in persistent pursuit of their personal best and able to get along with each other.
- To help develop students of strong character and decency with the social and emotional competencies to live and learn well.
- To foster empathetic students, considerate of themselves, each other and the world in which they live with sound and good reasons for the things they say and do.

## The key concepts that the children will learn through the program are:

- Treat others as you would like them to treat you
- Be brave– participate to progress
- Pursue your personal best no matter who you work with
- Have reasons for the things you say and do
- It takes great strength to be sensible.

We believe that this program ties in nicely with our current initiatives of the Resilience Project and restorative practices. The implementation of Play is the Way is just another way to support our students emotionally and socially so that they can learn effectively and reach their full potential in all developmental areas.
