From the Principal's Desk.

What does intervention look like at Overport? Can my child access intervention?

Intervention is any adjustment, modification and support given to assist a child to access learning and take part in educational experiences. Intervention can be for learning as well as supporting a child's mental health. Intervention happens in and out of the classroom. All students have had some type of intervention at some time to help them understand or develop a skill.

At Overport Primary School, we have a diverse student population. We have students that play competitive sports, play musical instruments, come from a variety of cultural backgrounds, speak a number of languages and have specific learning needs. Students come in all shapes and sizes and we value the learning journey they embark on at school. Our teachers receive ongoing professional development to enhance their knowledge and skills to deliver programs that cater to the needs of each of our unique students.

We have three tiers of intervention that occur at school. The first tier of intervention is the support that happens in the classroom. Teachers explicitly teach content to the students in the classroom. Teachers help students to set learning goals that personalise the learning for their specific needs. Teachers involve students in 1:1 experiences with the teacher, small group focus sessions and guided independent working time. Teachers are constantly thinking of ways to engage, inspire and motivate students to learn. Our teachers plan together each week and examine work samples, assessments and discuss their observations of student performance to design a classroom program that assists each student to progress and improve.

The second tier of intervention support includes the literacy and numeracy intervention programs that occur with Mrs Batty (LEAP) and Mrs Gilham (MAP). It also includes the tutoring groups for literacy with Mrs Vasta. This support happens outside the classroom in small groups. The students work on content similar to the students in their classroom but in a smaller setting with modifications. In this tier, students have use of technology such as sound field systems to clearly hear the teachers' instructions, decodable readers, C Pens for converting text to speech, apps for writing, sensory materials, individual and group counselling sessions with a social worker as well as animal-assisted therapy with Mrs Stevens and her dog, Ralph.

The final tier is the support given to students that have an intellectual disability, diagnosed learning difficulty, significant behaviour or physical disability. This includes but is not limited to, 1:1 support and small group sessions with an integration aide, visiting teachers for hearing, external services such as speech therapy, occupational therapy and psychologists.

We respect the relationship between home and school and encourage our parents/carers to work with us on their child's personal learning pathway. Our teachers are currently working on individual learning plans for the students in their classrooms. Once completed, these will be shared with parents/carers.

This year, students in year 3 and 5 will be participating in the National Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (NAPLAN) from May 10th to May 20th Students will be completing the modules; Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy online using laptops, excluding year 3 writing which will remain on paper.

This will be the first time students will complete the assessments online. Because of this, teachers will be spending some time in the classroom to help prepare them for the practical aspect of the online format. This preparation is important to ensure students will feel confident when completing the assessments and to ensure their technological skills do not get in the way of their academic abilities. 




